Course Description and Purpose

In this course, you will work as a research assistant in the HANDS Lab directed by Dr. Eliza Nelson. Dr. Nelson is a comparative psychologist whose main interests are laterality and motor skills. Lab projects address one or both of these areas. Scientific opportunities vary by semester based on research stage. You will be assigned to work on one or more active projects based on a combination of lab priorities and your individual training goals. The purpose of this course is to help you develop transferrable skills that can be used in any career path. This skill set includes "hard skills" like data collection and data entry and "soft skills" like communicating effectively and working on a team.

Student Learning Outcomes/Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Complete independent readings and summaries
- Reliably collect and/or generate data using lab techniques
- Reliably complete data entry and/or data cleaning
- Interpret data and present research findings

Expectations of the Course

This course is in person. There is no option to complete lab responsibilities remotely.

Attendance Policy: Attendance is mandatory. If you need to miss data collection or a lab meeting due to illness/emergency, you must contact Dr. Nelson. If you need to miss a scheduled lab slot, you must contact your graduate student supervisor.

Illness/Emergency Policy: To protect the HANDS team and our participants/subjects, there is a strict "stay home sick" policy. An illness is any fever, vomit, or diarrhea in the past 24 hours. An emergency is a one-time unavoidable occurrence. You do not need to share details of the event beyond when you expect to return to work.

Make-up Policy: Missed time must be made up in order to total 150 hours worked in the lab by the last day of classes. Failure to make up missed hours will result in an overall deficit for the semester and a grade of "F" in the course.

Undergraduate Research Assistants (RAs) are expected to:

- complete/maintain required research compliance;
- attend lab meetings;
- complete lab tasks as assigned by graduate students or Dr. Nelson;
- log hours worked in the lab weekly, totaling 150 by the last day of class;
- lead discussion of one article in lab meeting (prepared with graduate student);
- give final presentation on lab contribution (prepared with graduate student);
- interact with peers, graduate students, and Dr. Nelson in person.

Graduate Students will:

- check RA logs weekly and report to Dr. Nelson;
- assign tasks to RA(s) based on project needs and report to Dr. Nelson;
- prepare RA(s) to lead article discussion as assigned by Dr. Nelson;
- prepare RA(s) for final lab presentation as assigned by Dr. Nelson;

• interact with peers, undergraduate RAs, and Dr. Nelson in person.

Dr. Nelson will:

- oversee graduate student supervision of undergraduate RAs;
- assign articles to read for lab meetings;
- assign topics for final presentations;
- interact with undergraduate RAs and graduate students in person;
- write recommendation letters for students who earn a "P".

Assignments

All students must complete mandatory compliance before starting in the lab.

Students working on projects with human participants must complete/maintain:

- CITI online training "Social/Behavioral Human Research Course" (credential valid for 3 years)
- 2. CITI online training "CITI Health Information Privacy and Security (HIPS) for Clinical Investigators (credential never expires)

Fingerprinting is required for projects with data collection at MDCPS sites. There is an **out-of-pocket cost** for this background check (badge valid for 5 years).

Students working on projects with animal subjects must complete/maintain the following FIU requirements:

- CITI online training "Working with the FIU IACUC (Lab Studies)" (credential valid for 3 years)
- 2. CITI online training "Working with the FIU IACUC (Field Studies)" (credential valid for 3 years)

- 3. CITI online training "Working with Non-Human Primates in Research Settings" (credential valid for 3 years)
- 4. Submit FIU EH&S Risk form (annually with Dr. Nelson)

Students working on projects with animal subjects must also complete the following Monkey Jungle requirements:

- 1. Submit proof of a negative TB test dated within the past year annually. There may be an **out-of-pocket cost** at your healthcare provider. If a TB skin test cannot be performed, a negative chest x-ray can be submitted.
- 2. Submit proof of initial COVID-19 vaccination. There may be an **out-of-pocket cost** at your healthcare provider.
- 3. Sign a risk waiver.
- 4. Attend an on-site safety training session.

All students must give two presentations in lab meetings.

- 1. Lead discussion of one article in lab meeting (prepared with graduate student).
- 2. Give final presentation on lab contribution (prepared with graduate student).

All students must log 150 hours of research effort.

Research effort includes, but is not limited to, time spent on compliance, assigned readings/summaries, scheduled lab slots, scheduled data collection, meetings with graduate students or Dr. Nelson, attendance at lab meetings, and preparing lab talks.

All data collected in the HANDS Lab are the property of Dr. Nelson and may not be used or distributed without express permission.

Grading

This course is graded Pass/Fail. To earn a "P", you must log 150 hours of research effort. Attendance at lab meeting, including two presentations, is mandatory.
